Longwood Plains Conservation Management Network

Patricia joined the Nagambie Landcare Group in 2005, when she took over the management of my parent's property at Locksley, Victoria. It had been badly affected by over-stocking and the Millennium Drought, and

Patricia and her husband my husband were keen to embark on an ambitious program of protecting remnant trees and re-vegetation, especially along the three watercourses that intersect the property. They also felt it was important to establish wildlife corridors and shelterbelts in a strategic plan that would enhance productivity and take advantage of their property's location between the Strathbogie Ranges and the Longwood Plains.

As a member of the Nagambie Landcare Group, Patricia participated in courses, including Whole Farm Planning and Box-Ironbark Ecology and contributed to on-going tree planting and weed removal projects. More recently, has participated in the squirrel glider nesting box program.

Between 2006 and 2013, Patricia committed to six re-vegetation projects, taking up 12% of her property. These projects fell within the Longwood Biodiversity Action Project/ Goulburn Broken Regional Catchment Strategy. As their projects matured, they hosted a number of community field days and information sessions on our property. In 2011, Patricia joined the Committee of the Longwood Plains Conservation Management Network.


Rowan Wallace

Her work in Landcare draws on her professional skills – strategic planning, program design and implementation, evaluation, facilitation, and policy development. As a former senior public servant, Julie successfully led the development and implementation of many innovative programs that sought to meet the needs of disadvantaged and vulnerable people. Julie has managed her own consulting business for 25 years, providing strategic program advice to not-for-profit organisations, and to governments in Australia and in developing countries. Currently, I evaluate international aid programs in Indonesia.

Passionate about protecting public space in our urban area, Julie has been a strong advocate for community engagement, with a view that our public open spaces are more likely to be protected where (a) there are numerous, enthusiastic stewardship groups led by the community and (b) our public green spaces are used and loved by a wide cross-section of our community.

Community ownership is important to Julie. As the then chair of Friends of Willow Park, she led a collaborative strategic planning process with the Council to develop a 25-year master plan for the park, which resulted in the first community led master plan in the City of Wodonga. This plan has guided the conservation and development of the park since 2010.

During her last term as president of WULN, Julie chaired a three-way partnership between WULN, NECMA, and Wodonga Council to achieve the first community-led whole-of-municipality waterway action plan in the North-East of Victoria. The three partners have now committed to an ongoing collaboration to implement this action plan.



Robyn Gillespie

Andersons Creek Catchment Area Landcare Group Nominated: Fritz Uhl (Andersons Creek Catchment Area LG) & Artur Muchow (Middle Yarra LN)

Robyn Gillespie has been a major contributor to the work of Anderson Creek Catchment Area Landcare Group (ACCA) for 10 years and continues in the role of President as she has since inception.

Under her leadership, the organisation has achieved considerable success in meeting its objectives for

indigenous land restoration. Over the years we have planted 60,000 grasses and 5,000 shrubs and trees along with associated clearing and weeding.

Robyn is highly regarded and well-connected with organisations associated with Warrandyte regularly contributing to both public and organisational discussion on local indigenous environmental issues pertaining to the Yarra River, tributaries and associated waterways.

She is employed as a Team Leader with local environmental land management business Envirotechniques. In this role, she supervises a team of 8-9 staff. Envirotechniques contracts to local Councils, Melbourne Water, National Parks, Landcare Groups and others.

Robyn's team provide skilled advice and weeding and planting services to underpin and lead ACCA's limited volunteer team. In this regard, she has been highly effective in reaching out to local community and school groups and attracting occasional volunteering help for ACCA.

Susan Anderson

Bunyip Landcare Group Nominated: Mark Hocking (Friends of Mt Cannibal Inc.) Gerard Cunningham (Cannibal Creek Catchment Landcare Group Inc.)

A beef farmer in Bunyip for over 30 years, Susan is a founding and life member of Bunyip Landcare Group and has served as a committee member of the Western Port Catchment Landcare Network.



Susan has been a board member of PPWCMA since 2015 and is currently Deputy Chair and holds qualifications in Conservation and Land Management.

Since 2017, Susan has been a member of the Longwarry/Koo Wee Rup Flood Protection District Advisory Committee. As president of Bunyip Landcare, she has driven recognition of local Southern Brown Bandicoot populations, engagement with Wurundjeri and Bunurong peoples, and Gardens for Wildlife participation. Most recently, Bunyip Landcare instigated a collaboration with Cardinia Shire, WPCLN and PPWCMA to review shelterbelt design for climate change, and draft guidelines will soon be available for public comment.

In 2019, Susan was a volunteer coordinator of the BlazeAid response to the Bunyip Complex Fires and recognises the increasing effects of climate change on agriculture, communities and biodiversity.



Jim Armstrong

Western Port Catchment Landcare Network Nominated: Marijke de Bever-Price (Western Port Catchment Landcare Network) & Terry Hubbard (Upper Goulburn Landcare Network)

Jim's working life involved managing aspects of the family dairy/beef farm at Cann River. In 1990, he promoted the idea of a local Landcare group. During that time until 2004 they ran soil health, tree planting and whole farm mapping programs.

In 2004, Jim sold the farm and moved to Labertouche to a 60 Hectare property. He planted much of the farm with native trees using direct seeding and some tree stock. Today his farm has been planted out with approx. 20% native trees providing shelterbelts which has inspired our neighbours to do the same.

Some of Jim's achievements over the last 30 years include:

- Treasurer of the Cann Valley Landcare for 14 years.
- Representative of the East Gippsland Landcare Network.
- Joined the Labertouche Landcare Group in 2004 and was Vice President for 14 vears.
- President of the Western Port Catchment Landcare Network for some years and am still a committee member.

Jim is a great supporter of Bi-Monthly discussion group meetings run by Peter Ronalds for Landcare Members and is also an active member of the Baw Baw Food Movement.
